PRIVACY

Privacy settings allow you to restrict your public profile to your connections, network, or all LinkedIn members.



OPSEC

Unclassified information such as name, location and/or time frame can become classified when combined. Adversaries use the combination to identify and exploit vulnerabilities leading to increased risk and potential mission failure.

When writing about your profession, do the following:

- Identify critical information
- 2. Analyze threats
- 3. Analyze vulnerabilities
- 4. Apply countermeasures



KEY WORDS

Both recruiters and cyber adversaries search for your clearance information online.

Rather than listing specific clearance details, consider writing "clearance available upon request" in your summary section.

CONNECTIONS

Confirm that your connections are whom they say they are.

Counter-threat research found fake LinkedIn profiles connected with hundreds of unsuspecting people, conducting social engineering attacks.

ASK

If you are unsure of what to do, solicit advice from an immediate supervisor, security office, OPSEC PM, OPSEC Coordinator.
